Jellicoe's War Nicholas Jellicoe, 2024-12-31 In February 1917 German U boats launched a savage unrestricted campaign against both Allied and neutral shipping At its peak in April 860 000 tons of Allied merchant shipping was sunk Britain's supremacy at sea was being severely challenged and with it the chances of victory in the wider war Taking up the challenge was Britain's new First Sea Lord Sir John Jellicoe until the previous December C in C of the Grand Fleet famously described by Churchill as the only man who could have lost the war in an afternoon The battle he now faced was equally critical although the timeline of defeat was a matter of days rather than hours Britain's food stocks were dangerously low with wheat reserves down to six weeks and sugar to only two while wide scale shortages were crippling the industrial economy Jellicoe outlined the gravity of the situation with total candor to Rear Admiral William Sims USN sent over before America officially declared war by Franklin Roosevelt the Assistant Secretary of the Navy The two men already knew each other from service together in China during the Boxer Rebellion so Jellicoe's plea for urgent American assistance was taken seriously by Sims After the USA joined the war in April 1917 together they lobbied Washington for aid addressing their needs directly to two reluctant Anglophobes at the head of the USN Secretary of the Navy Josephus Daniels and Chief of Naval Operations William Benson Clearly a radical new approach to anti submarine warfare was called for and Convoy was the leading contender There were many objections to protecting shipping in this way some ideological but most practical a workable system for example effectively required state control of both shipping and distribution networks something inconceivable in normal circumstances However Convoy had powerful advocates including the Prime Minister Lloyd George who later claimed he had personally forced its adoption on a reluctant Admiralty This self serving political myth cast Jellicoe as an opponent of Convoy nothing could be further from the truth As both Jellicoe and Sims understood the key requirement was a rapid increase in the number of destroyers for escort duties America provided them the first arriving in Queenstown Ireland on 4 May and by June 46 were operating in European waters This was the first step in an Anglo American campaign that gradually brought the U boat threat under control and led to its ultimate defeat This book takes a fresh look at the undersea war as a whole and all the complex factors bearing on the campaign only one of which was convoy Its analysis is original and its conclusions thought provoking an important contribution to the naval history of the Great War

The book is replete with causes factual and antidotal and effects outcomes good and bad mostly bad

A must read for politicians concerned with globalization as it relates to history and future of the U S

De Krassel points out for example how the United States intended to make Japan a cornerstone of U S policy in Asia and proceeded to herald Prime Minister Taro Aso as Obama's first dignitary to visit the White House after his election even as Aso's own country was trying to get rid of him and did in July 2009

This as **de Krassel** points out was a slight to the Chinese especially in the face of Secretary Hillary Clinton's China bashing during her campaign

Environmentalists will also find intrigue in some of the book's observations such as how the U.S. pushes China for reducing its impact on the environment but among other counterproductive actions pushes China to increase its supply of steel's raw material of coke. Coke is derived from processing coal and thus causing increased air pollution. From an educator's perspective, I found some of the material about how China depends so much on the U.S. education system. This demand is boosted by students' drive for a U.S. degree. For example, some students employ stand-in candidates to take the English Language exams. There are hundreds of shooters stand-in exam takers working for syndicates or as freelancers that openly advertise their services. The author draws on both his intellectual knowledge and pedestrian experiences to weave this provoking book. De Krassel is a superb raconteur. My complaints are both mixed, namely the contents mimicking a cookbook leave me wanting for a more user-friendly way to locate subject matter and the index does not help much. The book reveals a myriad of important factoids but to identify the source you must access the author's web page. Researchers will have limited patience with this approach. This general history based on archival and monographic sources, some of which were not available to earlier writers, is designed to be a balanced and comprehensive synthesis. Seldom does a historian come upon a richer mix of colorful personalities, dramatic action, Byzantine intrigue, and momentous historical issues. The impact of Americans on China during the war was enormous. Much of U.S. activity in China because of inadequate knowledge of China's culture, government, and military capabilities was harmful to China and Chiang's regime. Moreover, U.S. efforts to induce Chiang to make reforms designed to improve his regime's war effort and chances for post-war survival were ineffective. The sulfurous American General Joseph Stilwell, assigned to serve as Chiang's chief of staff, underestimating the fighting ability of the Japanese and disregarding Chiang's advice, followed a strategy in the first Burma campaign that contributed to the loss of Chiang's best divisions and the chance of holding north Burma. Stilwell's obsessive demand for a new Burma campaign involved him in bitter controversies with Chiang, the British, and U.S. Air Commander Claire Chennault. When the British demanded that Stilwell be removed from Burma, he, with Roosevelt's support, demanded that Chiang turn over to him the command of China's armed forces, which was equivalent to control of China. But Americans could not enforce this demand on Chiang, who expelled Stilwell from China. Ambassador Patrick Hurley then attempted to arrange a coalition government between Chiang and the Communists, a proposal Chiang rejected. At Roosevelt's insistence, Chiang allowed America to send U.S. personnel, the Dixie Mission, to the Communist headquarters at Yennan. Mao Tse Tung convinced Foreign Service Officer John Service and others that he sought a cooperative relationship with America in order, among other reasons, to reduce his dependence on Russia. Before Stilwell's dismissal, Americans had decided to arm the Communists, but the removal of Stilwell defeated that purpose, and U.S. aid continued to go exclusively to Chiang. It appeared that the ideological preferences of Americans brought about a
