<b>Type of Figurative Language</b>	<b>Definition</b>	<b>Example</b>
<b>Simile</b>	A simile compares two things using the words "like" and "as."	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• busy as a bee</li> <li>• clean as a whistle</li> <li>• brave as a lion</li> <li>• stand out like a sore thumb</li> </ul>
<b>Metaphor</b>	When you use a metaphor, you make a statement that doesn't make sense literally, like "time is a thief." It only makes sense when the similarities between the two things becomes apparent or someone understands the connection.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• the world is my oyster</li> <li>• you are a couch potato</li> <li>• time is money</li> <li>• he has a heart of stone</li> </ul>
<b>Alliteration</b>	A repetition of the first consonant sounds in adjacent words.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• wide-eyed and wandering while we wait for others to awaken</li> <li>• Betty bought butter but the butter was bitter</li> </ul>
<b>Hyperbole</b>	Hyperbole is an outrageous exaggeration that emphasizes a point, and can be ridiculous or funny. Hyperboles can be added to fiction to add color and depth to a character.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• "I've told you a million times!"</li> <li>• I had a ton of homework.</li> <li>• If I can't buy that new game, I will die.</li> </ul>
<b>Personification</b>	Personification gives human characteristics to inanimate objects, animals, or ideas. This can really affect the way the reader imagines things.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• opportunity knocked on the door</li> <li>• the sun greeted me this morning</li> <li>• the city was full of dancing stars</li> <li>• the wind stole their fingers together to form a braid</li> </ul>
<b>Idiom</b>	An idiom is a phrase where the words together have a meaning that is different from the dictionary definitions of the individual words.	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• A piece of cake</li> <li>• Stick your tongue out</li> <li>• Pig out</li> <li>• Tie the knot</li> <li>• Head over heels</li> </ul>
