authority A better system would allow the students some level of freedom to define their own suitable projects that teachers could guide in ways to ensure the students learn core skills such as literacy arithmetic and the natural sciences through practical applications Such an interactive education would also be a way for students from different backgrounds to interact with each other This has the positive effect of breaking down class barriers and building a more empathetic society Though it was written over one hundred years ago many of the themes and concerns voiced by Dewey can be found in modern day critiques of the educational system In addition to lambasting an over reliance on testing Dewey questions over specialization teaching of abstractions over applications and the lack of time spent on developing skills that can be used outside of school
