

Chapter 14: Adolescence: Biosocial Development:

1. Puberty begins: *Puberty* is the time between the first onrush of hormones and full adult physical development. Puberty usually lasts 3-5 years. More years are required to achieve psychosocial maturity. *Menarche* is a girls first menstrual period signaling she has begun ovulation. Pregnancy is biologically possible, ovulation and menstruation is irregular at first. *Spermarche* is a boys first ejaculation of sperm. Erections can occur as early as infancy but ejaculation signals sperm production.
 - A. Unseen Beginnings:
 1. Hormones: organic chemical substance that is produced by one body tissue and conveyed via the bloodstream to another to affect some physiological function.
 2. Pituitary: a gland in the brain that responds to a signal from the hypothalamus by producing many hormones including those that regulate growth and that control other glands among them the sex and adrenal glands.
 3. Adrenal glands: 2 glands located above the kidney that produce hormones (epinephrine, norepinephrine)
 4. HPA (hypothalamus-pituitary adrenal axis): sequence of hormone production originating in the hypothalamus and moving to the pituitary and then to the adrenal glands.
 5. Sex hormones: gonads are paired sex glands that produce hormones and gametes. HPG (hypothalamus-pituitary gonad) axis is an important sequence of hormone production. GnRH increases the production of sex hormones
 - a. Estradiol: sex hormone, the chief estrogen. Females produce more than males do
 - b. Testosterone: a sex hormone secreted in greater quantities by males than females.
 6. Body Rhythms: brain responds to the environment. *Circadian rhythm* is a day-night cycle of biological activity that occurs approx. every 24 hours. The hypothalamus and the pituitary regulate the hormones that affect patterns of stress, appetite, sleep etc. Can cause a phase delay in circadian sleep cycles. Puberty circadian rhythm is delayed. Sleep deprivation is also common.
 - B. Age and Puberty: hormones increase in between age 8 and 14. Possible to predict puberty timing if genes, gender, body fat and stress is known.
 1. Genes and gender: 2/3 of variation in puberty is genetic. Sex chromosomes have an effect too. Height of the girl is 2 years ahead of boys.
 2. Body fat: heavier girls reach menarche earlier. *Secular trend* shows the long-term upward or downward direction of a certain set of statistics. Improved nutrition and medical care children tend to reach adult height earlier. Precocious puberty seems more common but still rare (before age 8).
 3. Hormones: hormones as well as genes affect sex differences, height and weight. All these might in turn affect puberty. The hormone *leptin* is a hormone that affects appetite and is believed to affect the onset of puberty. Leptin levels increase during childhood and peak around age 12. Body fat produces leptin. Precise impact of chemicals is not yet known. Female system is especially sensitive.
