

Document-Based Question: The 7 Principles of the U.S. Constitution

Background Information: The U.S. Constitution is based on seven core principles that provide the foundation for how the government is structured and how it functions. These principles are designed to limit the power of the government, ensure fairness, and protect the rights of the people. The seven principles are: Popular Sovereignty, Limited Government, Separation of Powers, Checks and Balances, Federalism, Republicanism, and Individual Rights. Your task is to analyze the documents below and answer the accompanying questions to understand how each principle is represented in the Constitution and why it remains vital to the American system of government.

Principle 1: Popular Sovereignty

Document 1A: Preamble to the U.S. Constitution (1787)

"We the People of the United States, in Order to form a more perfect Union, establish Justice, insure domestic Tranquility, provide for the common defence, promote the general Welfare, and secure the Blessings of Liberty to ourselves and our Posterity, do ordain and establish this Constitution for the United States of America."

The Preamble highlights the idea of popular sovereignty—the authority of the government comes from the people. It reflects the belief that the government exists to serve the people, and its powers are granted by the citizens.

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Document 1B: Federalist No. 39 (1788)

James Madison: "The government is ultimately the product of the people. The authority rests entirely in the people, and it is only through their consent that the government is valid. This republic derives its power from the great body of the people, not from a select class."

Madison explains that a republic, like the one created by the Constitution, derives its legitimacy from the consent of the governed. The people elect representatives who act on their behalf, ensuring that the government's power remains in the hands of the citizens.
